We put a high premium on social responsibility in our children but often lack an understanding of how best to develop values. Raising caring and considerate individuals who realize their full potential requires special conditions. Based on the developmental and relational work of Dr. Gordon Neufeld, Guelph's own Susan Dafoe-Abbey, Registered Marriage and Family Therapist and Authorized Neufeld Presenter and Practitioner, will address how cultivating the six roots of attachment sets the stage for caring multi-generational communities. She will also describe how adults can harness the power of attachment to make their lives with children easier and more effective. The Rev. Cheol Soon Park: moderator

The moderator of the 134th General Assembly came to Canada from Korea in 1983. He began his ministry at Kitchener-Waterloo Korean Presbyterian Church, before moving to his current charge, Toronto Korean Presbyterian Church, a thriving congregation of some 1500 souls. Over the last 20 years of ministry, Cheol Soon has served the wider church in various capacities: on the Committee on Church Doctrine, the Evangelism Committee, at the Centre for Asian-Canadian Theology and Ministry, and governing Board at Knox College, and as the clerk of Eastern Han-Ca Presbytery. Cheol Soon has been married to Karen for 25 years. They have three children.

"I think we have been in survival mode for so long that we have become quite comfortable with it," Cheol Soon says. "The church's future depends on the leadership of the church. We should look back to realize what has been missing in the life of the PCC. And we should look around to see what is available to improve the situation and to get the energy back to the local congregation. Reflection may be a luxury for us. Concrete action is a mandate. The local church should be a place that makes a joyful noise and wakes up people's heart and minds. In order to achieve it, renewal of leadership is a pre-requisite."



Mike Janzen: composer, songwriter, virtuoso

Raised on the prairies and classically trained at Providence College, Brandon University and the University of Toronto, Mike Janzen's journey has included forays into the worlds of rock, funk, folk and jazz. He has released two sparkling albums (Beginnings 2006 and Mombacho 2008) and has composed or arranged works for the Winnipeg Symphony, television and film. Mike performs regularly with the Mike Janzen Trio and occasionally

with friends, Jacob Moon, Glen Soderholm and Steve Bell. He is also involved in the music ministry at his congregation, Little Trinity Anglican Church in Toronto (Lucky them!)

Reflecting on faith and music, Mike says, "Songs have that ability to mine ideas that we have yet to unearth, and bring them into being. They demand emotion. They ask for honesty, they interpret our faith, worldview and bias into a language all can understand. Lately I've been struck by how true faith leads us to true action. To believe in Jesus means to follow what He taught. To worship God is to live lives that reflect the character of the one we sing about. As I walk this life, I'm finding that God is much bigger than my imagination has contained. That life itself is more of a gift than an entitlement. That justice and mercy are not my ideas. That change starts with my will being ready to be imprinted on. And that my prayer might be, 'never stop moving me.'"

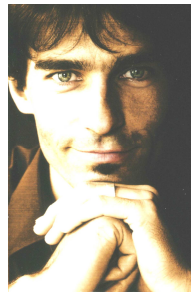
